President's Corner: CoA Joins Equity Alliance

Since 2019, CoA has been in the process of implementing a college-wide equity and social justice focus through initiatives such as Guided Pathways, AB705, Strong Workforce, Student Equity and Achievement, and supporting Board of Governor's Vision for Success. As part of our work to advance DEI and our commitment to equitable student success, CoA has joined 68 other California Community Colleges in participating in the second California Community Colleges Racial Equity Leadership Alliance.

The Alliance provides member colleges with resources, monthly trainings, and annual assessments aimed at improving equity and diversity outcomes. Their facilitators are distinguished DEI leaders from national higher

education associations; highly-cited professors who study race relations; chief diversity officers; and other experienced specialists from the University of Southern California (USC) Race and Equity Center. The California Community Colleges Racial Equity Leadership Alliance was developed by USC Provost and Professor of Management and Organization **Dr. Shaun Harper.**

The College will send up to 10 faculty and staff representatives to each online monthly session. The three-hour monthly sessions will feature a different equity-focused topic and materials from the presentations will

be freely accessible to all member college employees via a new online portal. CoA also will administer the USC Race and Equity Center's new climate survey, which will be made available to all Alliance member institutions in September/October 2022.

English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) instructor **Dr. Didem Ekici's** latest book *Person to Person Peacebuilding, Intercultural Communication and English Language Teaching* has been published through Multilingual Matters Publications this month. This book maps the discursive terrain and potential of person to person peacebuilding as it intersects with intercultural communication and online language teaching. The data collected through interviews and journals describe the profound transformations the participants undergo throughout their

intercultural English language tutoring journeys. Inspired by these voices, the book further explores ways teachers and teacher educators of language and intercultural communication can more deliberately leverage the affordance of peacebuilding, whether face to face or in the virtual intercultural borderlands of online exchange. The book that Dr. Ekici has written, with two other co-authors, is the product of three years of concentrated effort and collaboration.



Propeller Testing Takes Flight at the CoA Fab Lab

How can you take a complex topic and turn it into an interactive learning experience? This is a challenge CoA's Aviation Maintenance Technology (AMT) Program and the CoA Fab Lab took on for the AMT 76 Blade Pitch Propeller Project. AMT Instructor **Bruce Pettyjohn** reached out to collaborate with the CoA Fab Lab. He noted that students had trouble with understanding how pitch—essentially, the "twist" of a propeller blade angle at various points along the blade—affects propeller dynamics. So, he wanted to create a fun and educational activity for his class.

After showing us the basics of propellers, and outlining the design, the CoA Fab Lab used the free Computer Aided Design (CAD) software program, Fusion 360, to create a parametric five-inch diameter propeller model. We then made a Google Form where students would enter parameters for two propellers of their own design. Once they entered their desired blade pitch at set points, along with the total number of blades, we fed that information into Fusion 360 to update the model. A three dimensional file of their propeller was saved and then printed in the Fab Lab on the PRUSA 3D printers.

So, we had a whole bunch of propellers, but how were we to test them?

With some searching, we found a thrust test stand, designed for small propellers (think drones, and scale model airplanes). This stand accurately measures engine speed (Revolutions per Minute–RPM) thrust (the propulsive force a propeller would generate), power consumption (how much energy each specific propeller would use), and more. In order to shield students from harm, an enclosure was built in the CoA Fab Lab to house the test stand and propellers, some of which surpassed speeds of 15,000 RPM! On test day, AMT students processed their propellers, prepping them for testing. One by one, student propellers were mounted onto the test stand's motor and run through a repeatable test script that collected data. As we walked around the lab, students shared that they were eager to have their propellers tested. Some were simply curious; others had set up competitions with colleagues, claiming their propellers were superior. In the end, nearly 50 propellers were tested. Students were present, engaged, and saw their theories tested in real-time. The next step was to visualize the data, and see how the propellers stacked up against one another. In short, this was a successful case of an uplifting and informative hands-on learning opportunity for future aviation technicians.

Special Workshop Explores Equity in a Guided Pathways Framework

In February 2022, the National Center for Inquiry and Improvement (NCII) presented an online workshop titled Operationalizing the Big Ideas of Guided Pathways with a Design and Implementation Framework. The workshop was facilitated by NCII Founder and President **Dr. Robert Johnstone.** CoA President **Dr. Nathaniel Jones III,** Acting Vice President of Instruction **Dr. Diana Bajrami,** and Director of College Research and Planning **Ms. Dominique Benavides** attended the event.

The workshop explored ways that colleges can design and implement improved student experiences under a guided pathways framework using an equity lens. Participants were encouraged to brainstorm new institutional approaches that would enhance students' sense of connection, belonging, and validation. Suggested activities included: identifying and discussing limiting assumptions and beliefs about students and systems, benchmarking best practices at peer institutions, and using a Disney Imagineer approach to problem solving, in order to ensure that students of all backgrounds have equally positive college experiences resulting in academic success.






Join Us for Wellness Day on Wednesday, April 13

College of Alameda Joins Other PCCD Colleges in Rollout of New Student Engagement System

ConexED Case Management, Scheduling and Communication Software is rolling out in late March and will eventually be integrated with PeopleSoft (our student information system or SIS) and with Canvas (our learning management system or LMS). ConexED is an online tool that helps counselors connect with students in areas where students are looking for help. The system will help drive engagement, and ensure students get the help they need, when they need it.

The implementation is being led by counseling faculty including:

ConexED provides a number of features that counselors can use to connect with students and keep them on track for success. These features include easy scheduling of meetings (online, in-person, and hybrid), system generated alerts to help with follow up, and of course the integration with Canvas and PeopleSoft, so counselors can help students where and when they need it most.

Gabriel Martinez commented, "ConexED will be a game changer for how we interact with and serve our students both remotely and at campus. It will allow us to use one platform across many services to provide the students with a uniform and clean experience as they access the support they need."

Julie Saechao echoed the sentiment, stating, "The ConexED Platform is a great opportunity to reach, teach and talk with students online and counsel them through their academic journey. Once you get the hang of the platform it is really easy to use. The platform is user-friendly and the support team is great!"
