CoA Named Certified POCR Campus

College of Alameda (CoA) has been awarded status as a Certified Peer Online Course Review (POCR) Campus by the California Virtual Campus (CVC). This honor is the result of extensive training and hard work by CoA's POCR team. Faculty POCR team members that worked to secure certification were: **Brielle Erike, Jennifer Fowler,** and **Rich Kaeser.**

As a Certified POCR Campus, trained faculty mentors at College of Alameda can review and align courses to the CVC Online Course Design Rubric, then fast-track these courses through the CVC review process. Once alignment is verified, courses receive a "Quality Reviewed" badge and rise to the top of the search results on the CVC Exchange where students can search for online courses across the entire California Community College system.

Peer Online Course Review Coordinator Jennifer Fowler expressed enthusiasm about College of Alameda's continued advances in distance education.

"This certification represents yet another step forward in College of Alameda's commitment to quality online course design and student success," said Fowler.

CoA's current Distance Education Coordinator Rich Kaeser, pointed out how aligning his MATH 13 Introductory Statistics course to the rubric benefits faculty and students.

"Going through POCR was a great experience. I now feel confident that my students feel welcome in my online courses, and can easily navigate through the material," said Kaeser.

ADAM Program Students Featured in 2022 Designer Showcase

CoA ADAM Program students were featured in the 2022 Designer Showcase at Fibershed's Rooted in Simplicity event, on September 17, 2022, at the Fibershed Learning Center in Point Reyes, California. ADAM students **Chi Do** and **Lina Egutkina** participated in an innovative workshop that focused on making indigo dye vats at the Fibershed Learning Center in June 2022. They used the skills that they learned at the workshop to produce the original designs that were featured in the Designer Showcase. They were worked with Climate Beneficial fabrics such as Sally Fox's French terry with color-grown organic cotton, ribbed knit with California-grown cotton, and a beautiful twill fabric that was woven using undyed, California Rambouillet wool.

Fibershed is a non-profit organization whose mission is to develop regional fiber systems that build ecosystem and community health. Fibershed is collaborating with design schools in Northern California, like CoA's Apparel Design and Merchandising (ADAM) Program, to help influence the future of fashion in a more sustainable direction. An article about the collaboration was published on Fibershed's website, featuring an in-depth interview with CoA's ADAM Department Chair **Derek Piazza** (click here to access the full article).

When asked how the collaboration is helping ADAM students, Piazza responded that "collaborations with Fibershed are invaluable to our students. For ADAM Industry Talks, Rebecca Burgess speaks to our fashion students about the impact of the fashion industry on the earth current changes that continue to be made with local farmers, weavers, and dyers, and how those changes are positively influencing the fashion industry." He added: "Our previous collaborations have included Fibershed workshops on natural dyeing and mending clothing, which allowed students to take those learned skills and incorporate them into their collections."

According to Fibershed's philosophy and mission, in order to realize a more sustainable fashion future, tomorrow's fashion designers must understand how the whole life cycles of the apparel they create impact people and the environment. DiversAbility Event Explores Inclusion for People with Disabilities

On Tuesday, October 11, 2022, the College to Career (C2C) Program hosted a college-wide DiversAbility Event, which was sponsored by Student Life and Activities and Student Equity and Achievement funds. Under the leadership of C2C Coordinator/Counselor **Jennifer Sanoh**, DiversAbility promoted an atmosphere where individuals could feel comfortable discussing and exploring questions about accessibility, equality, and inclusion for people with disabilities. The event was open to CoA faculty, staff and students. Musical entertainment was provided and catered breakfast as well as lunch options were served.

During the day, DiversAbility participants had the opportunity to choose among various sessions related to disability, accessibility, and inclusivity. Topics included: Inclusive Disability Employment; Promoting Self-Advocacy for College Students with Disabilities; Introduction to American Sign Language (ASL) Basics; and Informational Session for Prospective College to Career (C2C) Applicants.

Sessions lasted 50 minutes. At the beginning of each session, participants were presented with background information and questions. Next, following a structured process of brainstorming and information exchange, participants discussed related barriers and solutions.

Participants also "took over" the grassy quad behind the F-building to engage in hands-on activities of tiedying tee-shirts and tote bags. The tie-dye event was very popular, attracting high turnout rates.

The term "DiversAbility" embraces the uniqueness and potential in every human being. DiversAbilities refer to physical, cognitive, developmental, learning, and/or neurological differences, or diversity, in ability levels. People experiencing medical conditions, genetic anomalies, physical and emotional trauma, social and emotional challenges, as well as differences in brain biology comprise the largest population of marginalized people in our world.

CoA support for the College to Career (C2C) programming has helped continue and expand C2C's mission to provide the community, resources, and education that students with Intellectual Disabilities (ID) and/or Autism need to be successful.

MESA Connect Project Welcomes Its First Cohort

In October 2019, CoA received a United States Department of Education Title V Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSI) Grant becoming PCCD's first HSI college. In Fall Semester 2021, College of Alameda's MESA Connect Project received additional grant funding from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to improve academic outcomes for LatinX students enrolled at HSIs.

The NSF grant supports projects, like CoA's MESA Connect, that are designed to increase recruitment, persistence, graduation, and transfer rates for Latinx STEM students through cohort-based learning enriched by culturally informed Course-based Undergraduate Research Experiences (CUREs). Intended outcomes include: broadening participation of students that are historically underrepresented in STEM, expanding students' pathways to continued STEM education, and integration into the STEM workforce.

With the support of administrators, faculty, and classified professionals, CoA's MESA Connect team held its first student orientation on August 15, 2022. A wide variety of services and workshops were offered at the orientation, including admissions assistance, counseling services, and financial aid information, followed by a campus tour. The cohort started classes on September 13, 2022, and were enrolled in Transition into Community College (LRNRE 505) and College Success (COUN 024).

The NSF grant will fund the College's MESA Connect team for two years. MESA Connect is a collaboration between CoA and California State University, East Bay (CSUEB).



CoA All Peer Mentor Training Held in September

On Friday, September 16, 2022, College of Alameda's Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS), Learning Resource Center (LRC), and ACCESO Program, hosted a full-day training for all peer mentors at College of Alameda. Nearly 20 peer mentors from EOPS, ACCESO, and the LRC participated in

this training. Students learned about the peer mentor role, including effective mentoring, boundaries, and success strategies to share with their mentees. Additionally, peer mentors were joined by **Sandra Arias**, academic success counselor with the Educational Opportunity Program at University of California, Berkeley, who presented a workshop on strategies for building meaningful relationship with mentees. Moreover, Financial Aid Officer **Jackie Vo** provided a training on completing the FAFSA/Dream Act, resolving Financial Aid issues, and SAP appeals.

Peer mentors heard from CoA Health Services Intern **Reynaldo Vargas**, who presented a workshop on the importance of mental health and wellness, what to look for when working with mentees, and mental health resources and services available to CoA students.

The peer mentor component in each respective program (LRC, EOPS, and ACCESO) is intended to support student retention, persistence, and academic success.

Career Center Staff Participate in CSUEB Project Rebound Event

Director of Workforce Systems **Stefanie Bradshaw** and Career Coach consultant **Kimari Williams** attended the Project Rebound event in September at the California State University East Bay (CSUEB) campus in Hayward, California.

CSUEB is launching their Project Rebound program, a special admissions and support program for formerly incarcerated students. Founded in 1967, Project Rebound has helped hundreds of students earn California State University degrees, while working to promote restorative justice, reduce recidivism, and empower individuals through higher education. Currently, 14 CSU campuses have Project Rebound programs working with formerly incarcerated students.

Career Center staff had an opportunity to connect with other area organizations and advocacy groups that support re-entry. They received the tools to create/enhance the employment services that the College offers to include the Justice Impacted community. These tools include: new professional organization contacts, funding opportunities, and potential partnerships.

Director Bradshaw stated that "through these new connections and relationships and by leveraging the county Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) grant funding that the career center currently receives, I feel confident that we can build a thriving Justice Impacted/Re-Entry program at CoA."
