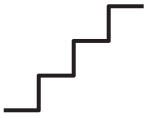

STARTING POINT:

**Building A**

1<sup>st</sup> Level

- Welcome Center: The spot on campus that can answer any burning questions or redirect you to the right office/department. The Welcome Center is meant as a place to greet students, provide student ID's, as well as scheduling and checking-in for counseling appointments
- Admissions and Records: The Admissions and Records staff assist you with admissions, residency, reclassification and registration
- EOPS/CARE/CalWORKS/NextUp: These collective of state and federally funded programs aim to support first generation college students who might be a part of special populations. They provide book vouchers, priority registration, counseling among other resources specific to each program
- Counseling Offices: Students are encouraged to see a counselor to ensure that they are enrolled in the correct classes needed for their particular academic goals. A Student Education Plan is developed with the counselors, which can show detailed progress on courses needed to graduate/transfer or receive certificate/degree.
- Transfer Center: Thinking about transferring to a four-year college or university? This spot provides information on CSU's, UC's, private and out-of-state colleges. They can help you with the applications to these schools and with reviewing the materials that need to be submitted in order to be a competitive candidate for these transfer schools.
- Financial Aid Center: This corner of the A building supports with Financial Aid Applications like the FAFSA and the Dream Act. They provide students with information regarding student loans, federal grants, work opportunities and scholarships. The Department also oversees the distribution and eligibility of the College Promise Scholarship for OUSD and AUSD graduates
- Cashier Office: Need to pay your fees or get a parking permit. The cashier's office is the place where anything related to student finances will take place.

2<sup>nd</sup> Level

- Dental Assisting: College of Alameda offers a competitive dental assisting program that consists of a year in the classroom along with local partnerships that open opportunities for internships

that allow students that hands-on experience. In this program you get to learn how to take x-rays, develop them, chairside manner, along with proper skills to be an efficient assistant to the dentists.

### **Building B**

- Auto Body: The space designated to take courses that will prepare you and give you hands-on experience in the practice of repair and painting of cars. They also have education on the hand and power tools to better prepare you for the workforce
- Automotive Technology: This part of the building focuses on the diagnostics and repairs of electronic and computer systems in cars. These courses will prepare the students to get a job as an auto mechanic specializing in the following areas: Engine Performance, Chassis and Drivetrain, Chassis Specialist, Engine Repair, Automotive Electronics Specialist and Light-Duty Auto Technician
