Teresa began her professional experience at De Anza College, where she interned with the Puente Program, worked full-time with the Office of Outreach, and part-time with the International Student Program. Throughout her career, she has thrived in supporting first-generation and underrepresented students, helping them navigate their educational paths and achieve their goals.

Charles Washington, M.S.W.

Charles Washington brings a wealth of experience and expertise to his role as a counselor and instructor at College of Alameda. His journey began as a part-time Counselor for COA's Brotherhood program, where he demonstrated his commitment to supporting students. Recently, he completed his Master's in Education with an emphasis in College Counseling at the University of Redlands. Marvin is currently pursuing his Doctorate in Educational Leadership at San Francisco State University, driven by his passion for empowering others through education.

The training introduced faculty to the CURE approach, emphasizing student-led research on real-world problems. This methodology has shown to significantly enhance students' overall learning experience.


